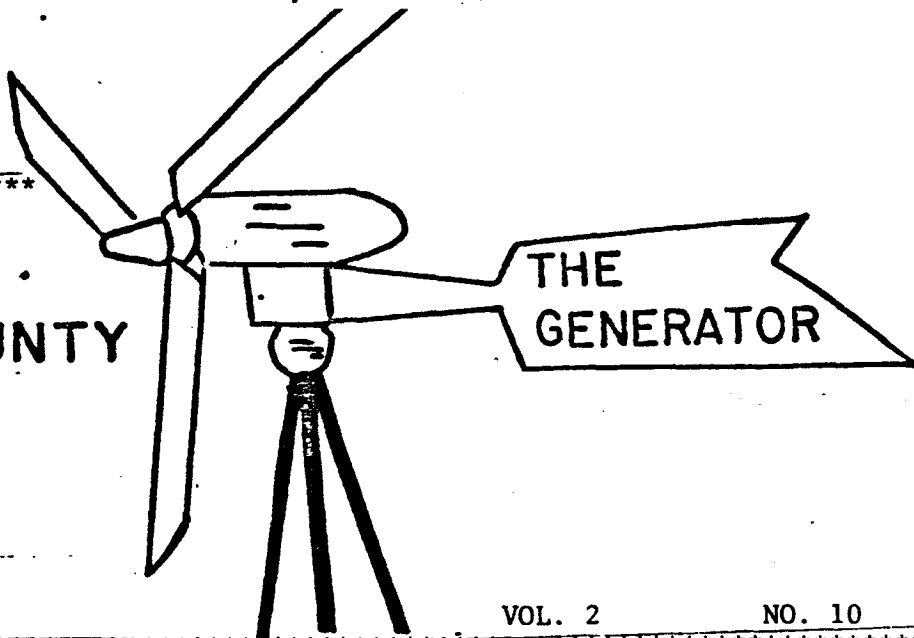

Attendance at any of these festivals should be most enjoyable and especially so for those with the ethnic background. Many of these groups are well organized, the French have formed L'Association du Francaise du Maryland. The German community will hold its three day festival in the fall done by the Deutsche-Amerikanische Buergerverein, that covers sixteen organizations.

Another interesting event coming is the sixth annual Virginia Scottish Games. This will be held on July 28th in Alexandria, Va. on the grounds of Episcopal High School. Alexandria is celebrating the 230th anniversary of its founding in 1749 by Scottish merchants, William Ramsay and John Carlyle. It will be an opportunity to watch competition among athletes, dancers, drummers, fiddlers, pipers, shepherders, etc. and to purchase Scottish food. Admission at the game is \$4.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children under 12. Advanced tickets may be obtained for \$3.00 adults and \$1.00 children by July 10th. 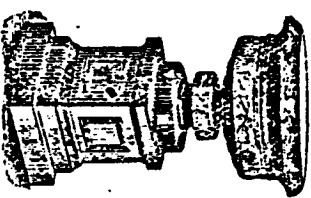

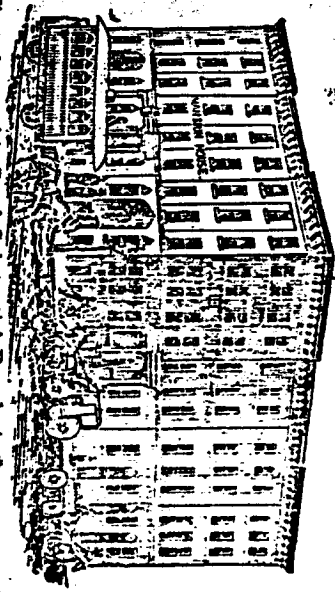
